

Sophomore earns shot at \$25,000 VFW scholarship

A speech that took only four-and-a-half minutes to record could land a Baumholder American High School student a \$25,000 scholarship. Katherine Bryson, a 16-year-old sophomore, recently won the European Voice of Democracy competition. Her entry now goes to Washington D.C. where it will be judged against 53 other submissions from students throughout the United States for the grand prize of \$25,000.

The Voice of Democracy is an annual competition sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Members of local VFW Iron Rock Post 2566 reviewed 27 entries from the Baumholder and Bad Kreuznach High Schools and selected Bryson's speech for submission to the European competition.

"This was a tremendous increase over the previous year when we received only five entries," said John C. Neilson, Baumholder VFW Post commander.

Each entry was judged on delivery, originality and content. "Katherine's story not only received the maximum score but it touched us old veterans on

a personal level," said Neilson. This year, students had to address the theme, "America's Role in the Next Century."

"The post members are very proud of Katherine and her achievement. This is the first time since 1994 that one of our young adults from Baumholder has made it to the national level." He said.

Bryson concentrated her speech on America continuing to be a world leader

in the next century. She explained that America needs to learn from past mistakes, focus on the future and adapt to world needs.

"It took a while to think about what I wanted to say but I decided that it would be for America to continue to be a world leader. I went into the details of what makes our country a leader, what we learned from the past, what we can learn from the future and how we can connect all that to continue being a leader," said Bryson.

"When I wrote it I thought it was really good but I didn't think it would really win. I wasn't expecting anything so when I did win I was really excited.

"Mr. (Richard) Smith, my English teacher, encouraged me a great deal to continue. He told me it was a good speech and that I should 'go for it.'"

Bryson lists speech pathology, music and physical therapy as possible career goals. "I'm undecided right now as to what I want to focus on," she said.

"I love music," she added. "I play the piano and the clarinet and I'm a member of the high school band and jazz band."

"She's just a top notch student," said Dom Calabria, Baumholder American High School principal. "She works very hard at what she does and she's

had some real good instruction by Mr. (Robert) Hartline, the music teacher. It's a nice honor for her as well as for the school."

Her entry netted her \$50 at the school level competition and a \$500 bond at the European level. She now stands to win the grand prize of \$25,000 that will be awarded to one lucky student in April after the national entries are judged. Second place at the national competition is a \$16,000 scholarship and several \$1,000 scholarships will also be handed out.

"I would like to thank Richard Smith from the Baumholder American High School for his dedication to this program and the students at the high schools for all their entries," said Neilson.

Smith has been involved with the Voice of Democracy program for many years, including those years that the Baumholder VFW post was inactive.

"I invite all of the students to start preparing for next year's contest," said Neilson.

2-6 Infantry keeps friendship alive at children's home

Soldiers from the 2-6 Infantry Battalion shared a Christmas Party with the boys and girls of a children's home north of Idar-Oberstein this past holiday season. The 2-6 Infantry has had a sponsoring program with the children's home for more than a year since returning from Bosnia in 1998. The relationship has included exchanging visits between Niederwörresbach and Baumholder. The last visit included a display of the battalion's vehicles to include the M2A2 Bradley.

"These visits are a great experience

for the soldiers and children. It gives them a chance to get together and learn from each other," said Chaplain (Capt.) John Kiser, 2-6 Infantry chaplain. The chaplain said that the relationship between the battalion and the children's home allows the soldiers to learn more about German culture and see the special needs of the children. While some of the children are orphans, there are also emotionally disturbed children whose parents see the children's home, sponsored by the German Protestant Church, as the ideal environment to nurture their special needs.

"The look on the faces of the children shows how much they enjoy the visits with the soldiers. The children have a chance to see just how fun loving the American soldiers can be," said Kaiser.



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Battering Rams tour Rome, hold seminar on wheels

Happy Millennium from the Battering Rams.

There are many ways in which people celebrate a feast day or spend a four-day weekend. Some like hiking in the mountains, others enjoy hopping bars, some travel far away; others stay at home or in the barracks. Last December, 40 people decided to spend Christmas in Rome by participating in a trip organized by the 40th Engineer Battalion and sponsored by the 1st Armored Division chaplain's office.

It was a trip that many will remember for a long time because they participated in the solemn opening of the Holy Year 2000 – Year of Grace. In the presence of thousands of pilgrims, Pope John Paul II opened the Holy Door in the Basilica of St. Peter just before Midnight Mass, thus officially starting the celebration of the beginning of the third millennium of the Birth of Jesus Christ. These Holy Doors are opened only during jubilee years, which fall usually every 50 years, and recall an old Jewish tradition from the Bible calling every fiftieth year a Year of the Lord. During

this Year, those who listen to the God of Abraham are supposed to forgive all debts, free all the slaves and enjoy and share the grace of the Lord. The West inherited this tradition. Even the word "jubilee" come from the Latin word "jubileo," meaning "rejoice."

From the start, this trip was different from many others because it was not just a tourist trip. It was also a seminar – training on wheels. The goal was to recall the traditions that have built our civilization, recognize the values that made Rome a special place in the history of the world and see those principles that our country proudly inherited and defends.

Along the way, the travelers heard from speakers as they talked about Rome as a cradle of civilization and personal dignity as a bases for civilization.

To illustrate that these topics were not purely theoretical but deeply rooted in our lives, the pilgrim Rams visited an American Cemetery in Florence, Italy. During a memorial service there, they associated their lives and daily sacrifices with the ultimate sacrifice of 5,811 American service members who died for the principle of human dignity and solidarity during WWII in northern Italy. On the grave of a fallen combat engineer they placed a wreath from the memorial

ceremony of a fallen comrade, SPC Julio Caldera from the 40th Engineer Battalion. In this way, his and their ultimate price for the freedom of the world was united.

the pilgrims arrived in Rome with visions of their fallen comrades still in their minds. In many beautiful Churches they saw the graves of martyrs and the beauty of art dedicated only to God. On the streets from Piazza del Popolo through Piazza di Spagna Coliseum and Forum Romanum, they felt the power, discipline and the pride of ancient Rome – the cradle of western democracy, as well as the pride of the people of Rome and the Glory of God.

It was a memorable trip that was made possible by the assistance of many people like: Lt. Col. John Jordan, commander of the Battering Rams, who provided organizational and moral support, and a host of personnel from the chapel community.

Special thanks go to the Westrich Tour drivers, who sacrificed their family Christmas to travel with the Rams and to the personnel of the USO in Rome and the contracting offices in Bad Kreuznach and Vicenza, for their professionalism and patience.

To these people and everyone else that helped make this a memorable experience, thank you.
